Our History:

Founded in 2006 for grades 6 through 10, TESGS has quickly grown into a premiere Kindergarten through 12th grade independent school serving almost 500 students on its two campuses in the historic town of New Bern, NC. The Upper School graduated its largest senior class to date in 2016 with 37 students all moving on to postsecondary institutions. The school is accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) and the Southern Association of Independent Schools (SAIS). TESGS is also a member of NCAIS, SAIS, NACAC, and SACAC.

- We host at least 4 **exchange students** each year. Previous students came from Spain, China, Finland, Germany, Haiti, and Montenegro.
- Upper School students help plan and facilitate three **International Family Nights** each year. Past events include performances from Taiko drummers, Chinese acrobats, and Thai Likay performers.
- All courses include required global components. Epiphany faculty do extensive professional development through several organizations, including UNC's World View program.

Academic Program

Graduation Requirements: A minimum of 27 credits in required courses and electives. Full-year courses (which include all core classes) receive 1.0 academic credit and semester courses receive .5 credit.

Outside Credits

Some students participate in dual-enrollment courses at Craven Community College through NC's Career and College Promise Program. The most popular courses include Writing & Inquiry, Geology, Principles of Micro/Macroeconomics, and Psychology.

These courses are included on student transcripts and calculated in the student's GPA as honors-level courses.

Students also have the option to apply to and enroll in the NC School of Science and Mathematics (NCSSM) online program. This extremely competitive program offers eligible students additional honors-level coursework that leads to a second diploma from NCSSM.

Grading Scale:

Cumulative grade point averages are based on final grades earned in TESGS-facilitated courses.

Weighting

Honors courses are awarded an additional .5 quality points. AP courses are awarded an additional 1.0 quality points.

AP Guidelines

Starting with the Class of 2020, students may take AP courses throughout their Upper School careers.

Students may also take additional AP courses through VISnet via NCAIS or other school-approved extension programs.

Academic Accomplishments

The Class of 2016 earned over \$2.8 million in merit scholarships.

Epiphany graduates have earned **Naval Academy Appointments**, been named **Park Scholars** (NC State), made it to the later rounds of the **Morehead-Cain** (UNC Chapel Hill) and **Levine Scholar** (UNC Charlotte) programs, and been named **honors scholars** at a number of colleges and universities.
