COVID Response

• 2019-2020 School Year:

- Ceased in-person instruction on March 16, 2020. Online instruction was asynchronous Monday through Friday with some faculty requiring weekly Zoom tutorials.
- Students received numerical grades.
- All sports and clubs were suspended for the remainder of the school year.

• 2020-2021 School Year:

- In-person instruction with distance learning available for students wishing to remain home.
 Online students attended synchronously via live streaming in most classes.
- Traditional course load was altered from seven classes each semester to six to mitigate the challenge of altering electives (music, theatre) to meet school's safety policies.
- Students received numerical grades.
- Most clubs were suspended. All sports resumed, but some seasons were shortened because of COVID concerns.

• 2021-2023 School Years:

- In-person instruction only. Quarantined students can attend class through synchronous or asynchronous platforms.
- Traditional course load requirements have returned (seven classes each semester). All electives have resumed.
- All sports and clubs have resumed.

Global Focus

- 85% of the Class of 2024 will have traveled internationally by graduation, 55% with the school. (Travel affected by Covid restrictions.)
- All freshmen engage in a school-subsidized service-learning trip with Immersion Abroad in Atenas, Costa Rica.
- **Seniors** spend their last month of high school participating in **long-range service projects** in Eastern North Carolina and **Belize**.
- Epiphany families host **exchange students** each year. Previous students have come from Spain, China, Finland, Germany, Haiti, and France.
- Upper School students help plan and facilitate two International Family Nights each year. Past events include performances from Taiko drummers, Chinese acrobats, and Thai Likay performers.
- All courses include required global components. Epiphany faculty do extensive professional development through several organizations, including UNC's World View program.
- Epiphany is fully endorsed by the **Global** Education Benchmark Group.

Academic Program

Graduation Requirements: A minimum of 27 credits in required courses and electives. Full-year courses (which include almost all core classes) receive 1.0 academic credit, and semester courses receive .5 credit.

Outside Credits

3.0 credits required

Some students enroll at Craven Community College through NC's Career and College Promise Program during their junior and/or senior year. The most popular courses include Writing & Inquiry, Principles of Micro/Macroeconomics, Psychology, and Sociology. These courses are included on student transcripts with the abbreviation (DE) after the course name and calculated in the student's GPA as honors-level courses. Students may only take two dual enrollment courses per semester.

Students also have the option to apply to and enroll in the NC School of Science and Mathematics (NCSSM) Online Program. This extremely competitive program offers eligible students additional honors/AP-level coursework that is calculated into the student's Epiphany GPA and included on their transcript with the abbreviation (NCSSM) after the course name. Participants typically take one course per semester.

AP Guidelines

Students may take AP courses throughout their Upper School careers but must seek permission to take more than two in a school year.

Students may also take additional AP courses through NCAIS, Virtual High School, or other accredited extension programs.

Academic Accomplishments

Graduating classes typically earn over \$3 million in merit scholarships.

Epiphany graduates have earned **Naval Academy** and **West Point Appointments**, been named **Park** (NC State) and **Benjamin N. Duke Scholars** (Duke University), made it to the final rounds of the **Morehead-Cain** (UNC Chapel Hill) and **Levine Scholar** (UNC Charlotte) programs, and been named **honors scholars** at colleges and universities nationwide.
